





- Change state regulations that had kept the land barren.




Advance Mitigation

- When mitigation req'd, evaluate "After".
- Apply difference as mitigation
- (Reimburse DWR in cash or kind for portion of project claimed.)





Results

- 200 volunteers, 1000 native trees/plants;
 1/2 mile of irrigation system
 (used for 3 yrs to help the plants establish);
- State procedure for Advance Mitigation;
- City & County riparian corridor policies (Riparian Restoration Action Plan);
- Awareness/support for creek & trail
 public, official, agency (SCVWD);
- Federal grant to build trail;
- Enlivened the community
 - created 10-acre openspace greenway.




Public Access Enhances the Environment
